





### Poverty Is Increasingly Pervasive Across Dallas County


Poverty within our public schools has been steadily increasing since 2004, growing from 56% to 73% of all students. 12 of our 14 traditional districts have more than 50% poverty across their campuses.<sup>2</sup>

Dallas County's total ELL population of roughly 133,000 students would represent the third largest school district in Texas and the 21st largest in the country.<sup>2</sup>



% Achieving Level 2 Recommended (3rd thru Algebra 1)





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







## Who is eligible?

If you live in Dallas ISD and your child will be 4-years old by September 1st, she or he may be eligible for FREE pre-K based on any of the following criteria:

- Unable to speak and understand the English language
- Educationally disadvantaged (eligible to participate in the National School Lunch Program)
- Homeless
- Child of a member of the armed forces of the United States
- Has ever been in state foster care

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

## What do I bring?

- Official birth certificate (any country)
- Up-to-date immunization record
- Child's social security card (if available)
- Current proof of address (such as a utility bill with address)
- Parent/guardian picture ID from any country

 Income verification such as W-2, current SNAP or TANF case number, or current pay stub (which would need to be re-verified in July)

## Strategies to meaningfully address these gaps

- <u>Awareness campaigns</u> focused on increasing parent / community demand for quality early childhood education seats (**Demand Side**)
  - Efforts underway supporting Dallas ISD's April pre-K round-up;
  - Pursuing opportunity for broader county campaign in summer
- Joint ventures with private accredited providers to increase number of classroom seats for pre-K students (Supply Side)
  - Increased demand must be met with learning space—and capable teachers
- Presentations by Commit Partnership staff to local boards to highlight the need and the impact of quality childhood education, including state and local benchmarking (Supply Side)
- Incentives to substantially shift focus of school leaders toward the earliest grades before achievement gaps widen (Supply and Demand Side)






# Intensive DonorsChoose effort to support student-centered classrooms





#### South Oak Cliff Feeder Pattern

Nine elementary schools in the SOC feeder pattern serve ~4,500 students, 29% of whom are English Language Learners and 95% of whom qualify for free or reduced price lunch. 40% of our 3rd grade students failed to meet minimal reading standards in 2012. While our schools are making great strides under committed leadership and dedicated teachers, it will take a village to support our children given the barriers they face outside the classroom. A classroom with ample resources is critical to advancing literacy achievement and we hope you'll consider donating to our classrooms. Each dollar arms our students with the tools they need to learn to read.
