Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD)

- Dispatchers provide 911 callers with valuable medical instruction while handling their call
- EMD combined with Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) allows the call taker to quickly initiate patient care via scripted protocols
- Emergency fleet units are dispatched while dispatchers remain on the phone with 911 callers

History of DFR's Use of EMD

- DFR started use in 2000 with dispatchers receiving extensive training on delivery of EMD
- EMD and CPR certification training is ongoing
- Most dispatchers are currently certified paramedics or have served as paramedics in the field

History of DFR's Use of EMD


 Dispatcher's medical experience helps reassure 911 callers

- Quality assurance program assures medical dispatch program compliance
- DFR's Medical Director has evaluated current EMD procedures

Dispatcher's Role

 Calming the caller down is an essential link to rendering aid to the patient quickly

 The Dispatcher provides medical instruction to the caller after the medical emergency has been ascertained





Dispatcher's Role

 Instructions may include reminding emotionally stressed patients to take life-saving medication (Heart attack)

 Information on EMD instruction is relayed to responders to ensure effective continuity of care between dispatchers and responding paramedics

Importance of EMD

 It is estimated that for every minute that Advanced Life Support has not begun patient survivability is reduced by 10%

- CPR needs to be started while units are enroute to increase survivability
- Callers reporting cardiac arrest can be instructed on how to apply CPR procedures
- Callers may also be instructed on what to do when childbirth is imminent

Importance of EMD

- EMD is used extensively across the country and reduces liability for call centers that would otherwise lack standardized instruction
- Scripted EMD protocols include those used in instances of:
 - Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation
 - Obstructed Airway
 - Airway Control
 - Emergency Childbirth
 - Diabetic Emergency
 - Seizures



Summary

- "Continuity of Care"-Dispatchers and responding paramedics assist the 911 caller throughout their emergency
- Life saving steps are initiated remotely before responders arrive
- "Quality assurance program"-Ensures that dispatchers adhere to protocols to enhance successful outcomes
