What is BITS

A partnership between the police department, Dallas Independent School District (DISD), and Verizon committed to helping prevent negative behaviors among students



What is BITS

- Life skills lessons aimed at 4th grade students ranging from
 - Drug awareness
 - Anti-bullying
 - Domestic Violence
 - Internet Safety



- Based on the highly successful LETS program (Law Enforcement Teaching Students)
- Four lessons lasting one hour

BITS Goals

Blue In The School is committed to helping prevent negative behaviors among students by:

- Specially designed curriculum based on the Six Pillars of Character
- Teaching life-long skills of decision making, negative peer pressure reversal, problemsolving, conflict management and character education
- Creating a positive environment for students to interact with police officers

Six Pillars of Character

Using the Six Pillars of Character, officers teach students how to deal with negative situations through lessons involving:

- 1. Respect
- 2. Responsibility
- 3. Trustworthiness
- 4. Caring
- Fairness
- 6. Citizenship

BITS Box

- Allows students the opportunity to confidentially ask questions they may be too embarrassed to ask during class
- When used in LETS, students made outcries of physical/sexual abuse and domestic violence






BITS Timeline

- In 2013, the Youth Outreach Unit added full time officers to begin teaching BITS
 - 28 schools were involved with BITS
 - 2,245 students were taught the BITS curriculum
- Seven additional officers were added to expand the program in 2014
 - Currently being taught in 33 schools
 - Spring of 2015 we will add another 30-35 schools
- Long term goal is to teach BITS in every elementary school located in Dallas (DISD & RISD)

BLUE IN THE SCHOOL LOCATIONS



Verizon Partnership verizon

- Funded BITS workbooks and Respect bracelets
- Expressed interest in providing funding to expand BITS into more schools

Verizon HopeLine Drive

- Students from BITS are asked to donate old cell phones and accessories
- Verizon distributes the phones to victims of domestic violence
- The school that collects the most phones donated wins a party at the end of the semester funded by Verizon



BITS Impact





- Obtaining approval through DISD Research Review Board to survey students taught BITS curriculum
- Survey results will be evaluated by researchers at the Caruth Police Institute

Summary

- Blue In The School is a vital part of DPD's youth outreach efforts
- Teaches life skills children may not be learning elsewhere
- Helps break the cycle of domestic violence and bullying
