## **Domestic Violence Facts**

- One in every four women will experience domestic violence in her lifetime
- An estimated 1.3 million women are victims of physical assault by an intimate partner each year
- 80% of domestic violence victims are women
- Females who are 20-24 years of age are at the greatest risk of nonfatal intimate partner violence
- Most cases of domestic violence are never reported to the police

# History of Lethality Assessment Program

- Designed by Dr. Jacquelyn Campbell of John Hopkins University
- Department was awarded grant in April 2012
- Implemented program October 2012
- The Family Place & Genesis Women's Shelter are our partners

# Lethality Assessment Program Goals

Reduce domestic violence by:

Identifying victims who are at the greatest risk of serious bodily injury or death,

- Reduce domestic violence murders
- If necessary, get victim away from the offender
- Encourage victims to allow domestic violence advocates to help


## Purpose of Assessment


- Identify victims in need of greater intervention by the High Risk Team
- Raise victim's awareness of level of danger
- Provide Courts and District Attorney's Office with offender information regarding condition of release on bail
- Indicate need for ankle monitoring

Note: The questions above and the criteria for determining the level of risk a person faces is based on the best available research on factors associated with lethal violence by a current or former intimate partner. However, each situation may present unique factors that influence risk for lethal violence that are not captured by this screen. Although most victims who screen "positive" or "high danger" would not be expected to be killed, these victims face much higher risk than that of other victims of intimate partner violence.

# **Summary Facts**

- Participation is voluntary, victims can refuse to answer
- Officers are required to offer screening in all intimate partner violence offenses
- In 2013 and 2014, 1,645 victims reported 3,700 offenses
- 31 victims generated 181 calls for police
- Numbers in LAP decrease as repeat victims are aware of the dangers and services available

# Summary

- The department will continue to use the LAP as a tool to aid in the prevention of domestic violence
- The Domestic Violence Unit will continue to use the assessment results to identify victims that may be at a higher risk of death
